May God bless you this Christmas and give you the fullness of joy in the birth of our Saviour.



BISHOP DAVID'S MESSAGE FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT



To my dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

On this Christmas Eve, our season of advent is nearly completed, now we are going to think about the theme of Love. We have reflected over the weeks on hope, joy and peace, and now we are going to think about love. That single English word has so many meanings and in the Greek Language, there are many words for love. As always, with our themes during this advent, we can only begin to comprehend the meaning of Love when we think about God's love for us. That is agape love, it is the complete and perfect love that is self-giving. 'Greater love has no one', Jesus tells us, than that they would lay down their lives for their friends' and we must be invited into that circle of the blessed Trinity's love for all people. I love the words that we will hear at the beginning of the reading in tonight's Mass during the night. The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light and those who live in the land of deep shadow a light has shone. Love shines a light upon our world in its darkness and shadow, Love brings to birth the mystery of God's great sacrifice for us. God's word became flesh and dwelt amongst us and we saw that light in Jesus. We are invited to undertake our own personal journey of Love into the heart of Christ. Our Love is not to be something which is limited just to a few, those we get along with, those we feel obliged to care for, and our love for ourselves. All these things are important, but above all, there should be in our hearts that great deep love for what God has done for me, for us, and for our world. There's no doubt about it, that our world is crying out parched for Love, and these days of advent we have been preparing for the birth of Love in Bethlehem. We make our own pilgrimage in love to the King of Love, and my prayer for you and your families is that you will experience a renewed Love of what God has done for us and a renewed Love for each other. Life's too short. Let's put aside all those arguments and disagreements and resentments that we have. Let's do what we can to build a world that is built upon love.

GIFT VOUCHER FOR CHRISTMAS



Christmas is finally here! It is a time to relax, reflect and enjoy family and friends. It is a time to share gifts of love. It is the one day of the year when, at least in our part of the world, "peace on earth, good will to all people" can seem to be a reality. Let us not forget in our prayers those areas of the world where that reality is impossible.

But is this the reason the Son of God came to live among us? Is this the reason we celebrate the holiday? The gospel writer John had a grander picture than the warm feelings that mistletoe and tinsel evoke. The reality behind Christmas can be overwhelming. God was born as a poor Jewish peasant over two millennia ago and the effects of that history changing event are still with us. It is more than the birth of Jesus. It is a *celebration of God with us*. It is the realisation that God's love and faithfulness dwells among us. It is a sign that we are to carry that love and faithfulness to each other.

If there is one thing that takes the edge off that celebration, it's the pressure of the consumer culture (on TV ads, in shops & internet) to give better, more unique presents to an increasing number of people. No matter how much we criticise the materialistic values that dominate Christmas, every year we can get pulled in.

So, what about this idea for a way of not getting quite as sucked in this year? Instead of giving so many material presents, we might give gifts of service and affirmation. We might undertake to write a letter to family members telling them what we love and appreciate about them. We could include a 'gift voucher' which might be a pledge to do some babysitting, or to take an extra turn at the washing up, or to pray

every day for a week for a special need. As we rack our brains thinking about what to put in our gift vouchers, we may well appreciate what it is to be truly other-centred in our giving. Not giving the gift we would most like to receive but thinking about what the receiver would most appreciate.

We might substitute some of the hours we spend in the shops, or online at Amazon, with time instead in quiet reflection thinking about how much each person means in our lives. In this simple act we may come to feel a heightened awareness of the preciousness of each family member and friend, especially useful if we need to lay our pride aside and say sorry too.



THE FIRST MARTYR



In celebrating the birth of our Saviour, we were full of joy and expectation. But suddenly on Boxing (St Stephen's) Day the atmosphere has turned sombre.

According to the Acts of the Apostles, St. Stephen was a deacon in the early Church at Jerusalem and was appointed by the Apostles to bring about the distribution of food to the poor. He performed many miracles but he also angered members of various synagogues by his teachings as a follower of Christ. Accused of blasphemy at his trial, he denounced the Jewish authorities and they had become enraged with him. They judged that St. Stephen should be stoned to death. Weakened from the stone bombardment and filled with the power and spirit of God, Stephen looked up intently to heaven and saw Jesus at the right hand of God. St Stephen, the first Martyr, even prayed for his persecutors as he lay dying. Saul of Tarsus was one of them, he was guarding the cloaks of the stone-throwers and fully approved of their actions. We know this man was later converted to the faith and became the great missionary St Paul. The writer of the Acts of the Apostles (St. Luke) spent some time journeying with St. Paul and so his account of these events can be taken as more or less how Paul had witnessed it.

But why does the Church commemorate the gruesome stoning to death of St Stephen so soon after the celebration of the Nativity of Christ? The intention here is not to demote Christmas, but to manifest more clearly an important meaning of the Christmas celebration - that Christmas should essentially renew us in becoming a true disciple of Christ...and a true disciple ought to tread the way of the cross – "If any want to be my disciple, let him deny himself, take up his cross and follow me" (Lk 9: 23). Christmas becomes a true reality when Jesus is born in our hearts... St Stephen experienced the joy of having Christ born in His life. We might reflect on whether we today experience Christmas in a similar way that transforms and makes us authentic disciples, discovering the true and genuine meaning of Christmas in our lives!

St Stephen is also patron saint of altar servers. He would have seen the warmth and compassion Jesus showed to those He healed and witnessed His desire to help others. It was these characteristics that inspired Stephen to reach out and help those in need. He would also have been aware of the time Jesus spent in prayer and how that prayer inspired him. This is why Altar Servers are important. They bring reverence and dignity to our prayer celebrations - most especially the Eucharist. Let us ask Jesus to open our hearts like St Stephen *to help the vulnerable, the sick, those unemployed, those suffering domestic violence or torture because of their faith.*

A NEW CARD READER



Parishioners regularly ask me about the possibility of donating to the Parish via credit/debit cards. The reason for this is that we carry much less cash on us, and it would be more convenient for some parishioners to support the Parish in this way. To give people this opportunity, we will install a Donation Station with a card reader at St Edward's Church. This is initially on a 3 months trial, to see how helpful and successful it will be. This device will cost the Parish £15 per month to rent. As always, I thank you for your generosity and please feel free to speak to me if you have questions or concerns regarding the security and use of this reader. Once we have a sim card the 'dona' station can be activated and it will stand next to the statue of the Sacred Heart.
