LETTER FOR THE FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT 2024



 ${f T}$ o my dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

This year, we hear a very short account of Jesus' time in the wilderness. In fact, unlike the Gospels of Matthew and Luke, Mark does not give us any detail of the temptations Jesus faced during this time in the desert. Maybe there is something very helpful to us in this. We do not have the power to change stones into bread. We would be very foolish to try throwing ourselves off high places, in the hope we would be caught by angels. And then, isn't every sin a bowing down to worship our enemy? We are simply told that our Lord was 'tempted by Satan'.

I love these encouraging words from the Letter to the Hebrews, 'For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathise with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.' (Heb 4.15- 16)

We are not disciples of a Lord who stands apart from our weakness and temptations. But Jesus has overcome these temptations. And this means a powerful grace for ourselves. It means we can drink deeply from the mercy he has won for us on the throne of his glorious Cross.

What we hear in today's Gospel is very much part of our heavenly Father's loving plan of salvation. Because of the Fall, humanity fell from the life of grace. We lost our relationship of intimacy with God. And let's be honest here, we struggle to get along with each other most of the time. And so God found a way to bring us back home.

The Holy Spirit drove Jesus out into the wilderness. This sounds a bit more than just a suggestion or a hint. Jesus is compelled to go out into the desert with the loving obedience of a Heart that is totally focused on the Father's will. And this becomes our vision for the Season of Lent. This is a time of great blessing. What a gift is offered us over the coming days.

Jesus was with the wild beasts. It is relatively safe to be a Christian in our part of the world. Sadly, this is not so for every disciple of the Lord. And it wasn't for those first Christians who read this Gospel. They were being persecuted and martyred for their faith by the Roman authorities. They were keeping company with wild beasts in the circuses of the Empire. But then we hear something else. We hear what happens when Jesus' forty days in the wilderness were over. Jesus began his Galilean ministry. He proclaimed the good news of the Kingdom. The work of bringing home the lost and suffering begins. And this work still continues today. And this mission is our task today.

I truly hope and pray, we all have a blessed and grace-filled Lent this year.

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FOCUSSING OUR HEARTS



Almsgiving, prayer, and fasting represented practices of popular piety during the time of Jesus. They were especially popular among the Pharisees. We have seen that Jesus did not criticise the practices but He did comment on their motivation. The way people prayed, fasted and gave alms marked the difference between the follower of Jesus and the Pharisee. Did one perform these practices boastfully to look good in the community and increase reputation? Or did one pray, fast, and give alms quietly with the sole intention of pleasing God? We might ponder this question during Lent; what resolutions have we made for Lent and why have we chosen these resolutions? Do they serve self-more than others and how?

If our answer gravitates more towards ourselves than others, it is time to reassess our motivation. Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are only a means to an end. We practice them to open ourselves up to God and the needs of others. So, during Lent, we should focus on relationship, not on reputation. Lent is a time for self-reflection and for action. Lent is not a time to merely "give up something". It is a season to **do** something - for **others** and for **God**. It is a time to focus the heart. Over the next week, we might resolve to focus on others less fortunate and on God. This will help make this Lent a time for our spiritual growth.

So, in Matthew 6 this week, Jesus teaches His disciples the Our Father, not objecting to the number of prayers but the way they were used. Gentiles prayed in vain repetitions, thinking they could control deities by the precise use of their names and the concise number of their invocations. They wanted control but not for contemplative purposes like with the Rosary.

Also notice how Jesus linked prayer with forgiveness. The entire exercise of Christianity hinged on the belief that God would come to judge the world and show the followers of the Christ mercy, but that mercy was contingent on the mercy Christians showed to others. In essence, the Our Father and the faith of the petitioner depended upon the virtue of forgiveness. *Who do we need to forgive this week?*

Later in Matthew's gospel (5: 20-26), Jesus comments on the Commandment which introduces us to concepts that define proper relationships with other people. For example, He applied the commandment "Thou shalt not kill" to the everyday judgments and insults that people make and the anger that they can harbour for one another. To modern Westerners, the insult "Raca" (meaning "empty-headed") and "fool" might not seem especially derogatory, but the gospel indicates that in the time of Jesus they had that possibility. "Fool" meant "godless" (Psalm 14:1). The Greek word "Raca" (from the Aramaic term *reqa*) could refer to renegades and was used to call someone mentally inferior and worthless as a person. It was an offensive name used to show utter contempt for another person. Jesus warned that the use of such a word to describe someone was tantamount to destroying that person and was deserving of the severest punishment of the law.

Matthew's gospel used extreme language to make the point that insults are judgments and can be given to maximise shame. The one who was the object of the insult became the victim. How could one repair the damage of the insult? Jesus used the image of the debtor prison to make His point. Act quickly to minimise the damage, otherwise the damage will fester and grow. In the end, the shame might return to the one giving the insult.

People do make judgments against others, often behind their backs. And sometimes insults can be given under the guise of "teasing", particularly in social gatherings where, at worst, the teaser might obtain some selfsatisfaction (usually hoping for third party approval) at the expense of the teased. The results can be hurtful, even damaging and sometimes we might never know how the other person may be feeling as a result of our injudicious words!

Let us reflect... How do we tease others or make judgments about them? How have we followed the advice of Jesus and apologised quickly when damage is done?
