You can always request confession before or after any weekday Mass.



LETTER FOR PASSION SUNDAY 2024



 ${f T}$ o my dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

A reflection on this Passion Sunday Gospel may begin with a question, which Gospel? Many of us will hear the account of Jesus sending two of his disciples to the village to find a tethered colt. Jesus even gives the disciples the answer they must use if anyone questions them about this seeming act of theft. Jesus then rides into Jerusalem to a rapturous welcome from some at least. We listen to this Gospel before our liturgical re-enactment of this moment by procession into our churches. It's a strange story. We very easily get the sense that Jesus is in charge. He is not only the central figure in these events, he is director and producer too.

Things seem to change very quickly when we consider the passion of our Lord Jesus Christ. This year we listen to St Mark's account of these events. The action begins in Bethany and the woman 'wasting' the expensive perfume over Jesus' head. There is much for us to ponder here. Are we so generous in our witness to our faith in Christ? Are we prepared to become disciples without counting the cost? Again, we need to hold this truth in our hearts. All this is about Jesus. This event is a mystical prelude to what Jesus will accomplish on the Cross. He will be obedient to the Father's will and lay down his life in love for us.

There is so much mystery in the story which unfolds. Again, disciples are sent into the city and invited to prepare the room where Jesus and his disciples will eat the Passover. This is not any ordinary table reservation in a local hostelry. The moment echoes the earlier one with the finding of the colt for Jesus to ride into the city. Now they must follow a man carrying a pitcher of water. Something in all of this may encourage our hearts to look forward to the Easter Vigil. There will be water there. The blessing of the font. Possibly baptisms, and certainly our renewal of baptismal commitment with the sprinkling of water.

At the end of the Passover meal, psalms are sung and Jesus and his disciples leave for the Mount of Olives. Things seem to change. The weakness of the disciples is very much on display. Something seems to slip away from Jesus himself. We hear the chilling words of the traitor, 'the one I kiss, he is the man. Take him in charge'. It seems that others are now in command. Despite the prophetic words of our Lord, 'you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of the Power and coming with the clouds of heaven', there is an inevitable impetus towards the death and destruction of Jesus of Nazareth.

The desolation reaches a new pinnacle when Jesus cries out from the Cross, 'My God, my God, why have you deserted me?' And if others are assured this prefaces the end of it all, through the gift of faith, we know differently. We hear the testimony of one who came to faith whilst standing at the foot of the Cross. We too echo the words of the centurion, 'Truly this man was the son of God.'

WASHING THE FEET OF OTHERS

As we move into Holy Week, we might consider the responsibilities that reception of the Eucharist places upon us. What sort of God do we reveal to others? A simple question with a difficult answer.

Of course, we know God is love. God loved us so much He gave His Son for the salvation of the world. But if God is love, although we will never be able to equal His love, some people ask why aren't Christians more loving? In a simple, humble act of service which we honour on Thursday, Jesus revealed what sort of God we worship. And He gave us a command to act in the same way. Despite the caveat of Judas in John 13:2, these verses led up to the act of love He would show His followers: the washing of their feet. This can be divided into three sections: the washing and Jesus' insight, Peter's objection, and Jesus' command to do likewise.

Because Jesus came from God, because He had the power to lay down His life and take it up again, because He was all-powerful like His Father, He could tie a towel around His waist and wash His followers' feet. Because He was God, He could so humiliate Himself. All for love.

Peter confused Jesus' service with the hospitality of a Jewish host. At that time, Jewish homes had jars filled with water for ritual cleansing. When Jews entered a home, they would use the water to wash their head and hands as a means to purify themselves (make themselves ritually "clean"; see John 2:6).

When Peter objected to Jesus' foot washing, he questioned the humbling (even humiliating) role of Jesus as servant. Jesus countered with a rejection of association, clearly something Peter cherished. Since ritual purity preceded table fellowship (one had to cleanse himself before he could eat with friends at a party), Peter insisted Jesus wash his head and hands as a sign of ritual "cleansing." Still, Peter missed the point. He was ritually "clean" since he had (presumably) done the washings.

Jesus had added a new level of association. No longer was ritual purification needed. No, to be a follower meant something deeper. A Christian willingly receives and gives service. A Christian "washes the feet of others," even those who would betray them. After all, Jesus did wash the feet of Judas!

When we compare these two commands of Jesus at the Last Supper, ("Do this in memory of me" and, referring to the washing, "I gave you an example so that you may copy what I have done to you."), certain themes come forward.

In Matthew, Mark, Luke and 1 Corinthians, Jesus invoked the command during the Words of Institution. In the context of the Eucharist, the reception of the Body and Blood marked the Christian. For the Christian had a share in the Lord's pending death and resurrection. And a share in risen, everlasting life. In John's Gospel, Jesus told His followers to serve others, even if that meant being a slave. This defined the Christ and His follower.

Receiving risen life and communal service actually complement each other. One is a moment of revelation; the other is a moment of mission. As we read the Gospels, revelation entailed mission. (For example, when Jesus revealed himself to the Samaritan woman at the well, the woman responded by spreading the Good News; see John 4:25-29.) When the two commands converged at the Last Supper, the questions became clear. What did the disciples encounter at the Last Supper? What were they to do with this encounter? They encounter the Lord and His risen life. They also made a commitment to serve each other as the Lord had served them.

Jesus gave us a revelation in an example of service. When He washed His disciples' feet, He showed them His Father, the God of love. When He gave His command to "do as I did to you," He gave us a responsibility to reveal the God of love through our love.

How do we plan to "wash the feet" of others this week? How will this act of love help us prepare for Easter?



A FUNDRAISING INITIATIVE ON PALM SUNDAY



The money raised by our parish often goes on major expenditure, which is not noticeable, for instance this year we will be having to pay for *a new garage door, five windows in the parish hall and 33 windows in the parish house*. Although essential, these do not necessarily deepen our faith.

Last year we bought a beautiful statue of the risen Lord. This year on Palm Sunday it would be good if we could cover the cost of the *new edition of lectionaries* (books with Mass readings), which every parish has to purchase. We will need lectionaries for all four of our churches. I would be grateful for even a small donation, when you take a palm cross on Palm Sunday. Thank you!

This would require two parishioners at a time to be present in the church during that period at all times to keep watch. Car Parking at Youth Justice Service -73 / 75 London Road Kettering Northants NN15 7PQ

We have been informed that visitors and churchgoers cannot use this car park during the week, otherwise there is a risk of being 'blocked-in', while the staff of the YJS are out on visits, doing their job, which could last all day. By parking or remaining in the car park, drivers accept liability of being 'blocked-in'. Church visitors were asked to refrain from parking, but they are continuing to do so. It is acceptable for us to use the car park at weekends because the staff are not there and the 'blocking-in' does not occur. Thank you for your understanding.

MOVING WITH THE TIMES - CASPAR

This is a message from the Diocese: In March 2020, our nation went into lockdown. At this point we recognised the challenge we faced in effectively communicating outside of Sunday Mass announcements. Alongside this, we have been seeking a way of ensuring GDPR compliance through all parishes and diocesan departments.

Some of the parishes in our diocese have helped to design a solution. 'Caspar' is a digital solution program which begins as a parish database. Many parishes across our diocese are already using Caspar successfully and reaping the many benefits from it.

I would like to reassure you that Caspar is a parish tool which we hope will improve efficiency of communications for your parish team and enable parishioners to feel valued, digitally. It is not a diocesan tool used by us centrally to communicate with parishioners. All individuals must give permission through Caspar for any diocesan communications outside of those already in place. I hope this clarifies the purpose of Caspar for you.
