TO WHOM WOULD WE GO?



Gospel readings this week introduce the Eucharistic discourse in John 6. Jesus said "I AM the living bread which came down out of heaven. If anyone eats of this bread, he will live forever. Yes, the bread which I will give for the life of the world is my flesh."

The crowd focused on the literal (cannibal) suggestion of John 6:51. Of course, they missed the point of the phrase "living bread" (how can consuming someone that continues to live be considered cannibalism?). Jesus was explaining that they consume His Body and Blood to gain eternal life. He shifted towards the sacramental meaning in 6:57 when he said "As the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father; so, he who feeds on me, he will also live because of me."

Notice the causal relation as well as the temporal one. The Father lived forever, so the Son who depended upon Him lived forever, so the disciple who ate of His flesh and drank His blood would live forever. And, the living Father sent the Son (entering time) to give life, so the disciple would be implicitly sent (when the time was right) to proclaim the living Christ in the Good News. Receiving the Eucharist means more than eating "the bread of life." It means depending more upon the Risen Christ and sharing in His mission.

After the Eucharistic pronouncement in John 6, although people were attracted by His signs and His teaching, some could not abide the command to "eat His flesh and drink His blood" (6:53-56). Cannibalism and consuming blood were abhorrent to Judaism and these followers could not go on, even as the Lord reminded them of His origin (6:62). Their earthly thinking ("flesh") could not comprehend revelation ("words of spirit and life"). No wonder, for faith is a gift from the Father (6:65).

The doctrine of <u>transubstantiation</u>, the teaching that bread and wine are converted into the glorified body of Christ, is difficult conceptually. When Christ first told His followers of it, many disciples turned away – and interestingly Jesus let them go. He did not clarify or correct their misunderstanding. He simply repeated His command to the disciples at the Last Supper. What would happen to those who remained? Would they leave? Peter had it completely right: "Lord, to whom would we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Christ, the Son of the living God." (John 6:68-69)

Some Christians today still have trouble accepting this teaching. However, many people have reported Eucharistic Miracles that brought them back to the truth. The Church has recognised over one hundred such miracles, the more famous ones occurred in Lanciano, Italy, also Buenos Aires (1996) and Poland even more recently. The blood and flesh that developed on these hosts (integral to it and not merely placed on top as some form of hoax) has been independently scientifically analysed in pathology labs in several academic institutions around the world. All reveal similar evidence that the flesh is human heart tissue containing products suggestive of near-death extreme stress (eg: adrenaline). The flesh and blood also retain substances suggestive that it is actually still living (13 centuries later in Lanciano's case!). Incredibly the rare blood type is the same as that which appears on the Turin Shroud, the cloth which we believe was used to cover Christ when He was laid in the tomb.

How has the Eucharist drawn us closer to Christ? How have we shared the Eucharist with others, even outside of Mass? How do you view Eucharistic Miracles? Sceptical? <u>View the evidence here!</u>

MOVING WITH THE TIMES - CASPAR

This is a message from the Diocese: In March 2020, our nation went into lockdown. At this point we recognised the challenge we faced in effectively communicating outside of Sunday Mass announcements. Alongside this, we have been seeking a way of ensuring GDPR compliance through all parishes and diocesan departments. Some of the parishes in our diocese have helped to design a solution. 'Caspar' is a digital solution program which begins as a parish database. Many parishes across our diocese are already using Caspar successfully and reaping the many benefits from it. I would like to reassure you that Caspar is a parish tool which we hope will improve efficiency of communications for your parish team and enable parishioners to feel valued, digitally. It is not a diocesan tool used by us centrally to communicate with parishioners. All individuals must give permission through Caspar for any diocesan communications outside of those already in place. I hope this clarifies the purpose of Caspar for you.

Pastoral Message

Catholic Safeguarding Standards Agency Baseline Audit Report

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

Following months of preparation, a substantive baseline audit of safeguarding across our diocese by the Catholic Safeguarding Standards Agency took place in November 2023. This was a planned audit in line with recommendations presented in the final report of the Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse, ICCSA published in 2020.

Creating and developing a culture of safeguarding and protection of the vulnerable within our church is the responsibility of each of us. It requires every member of our diocesan family to be vigilant, to take time to know our procedures and to pray that all within our places of worship will uphold the dignity of all God's children.

I am pleased to share with you that we received a grade of 'comprehensive assurance' in six of the eight standards with one more being rated as 'exemplary' and the last graded as 'firm progress'. Our overall grading was rated as 'comprehensive assurance'. There is a great deal to be encouraged by as we strive to embed safeguarding practices in our everyday mission.

To this end, I wish to thank you all. The audit has affirmed our commitment to safeguarding, it has recognised the dedication of many people engaged in this valuable ministry and given clear indication of the recommended areas of improvement.

Having said this, we must not get complacent. We should all continue to place those who have suffered in our Church at the heart of our response to abuse. As I read the report, I was reassured that the audit team had reflected that we have a "survivor-led approach" to safeguarding which "involves a wide range of Diocesan individuals, from leadership to volunteers".

I would like to take this opportunity to thank a few of the individuals and groups of people who work tirelessly in this area. Every parish in our diocese has at least one Parish Safeguarding Representative. As volunteers the parish representatives give up a considerable amount of time, sharing the messages of safeguarding, implementing diocesan and national policies and procedures, and promoting good and safe practice within the local area. We are blessed by their dedication and sensitivity as they often are the 'first responders' to concerns.

Our diocesan trustees and safeguarding advisory board offer oversight and governance of our safeguarding practices. The report highlights that the "diocese has good oversight of key safeguarding risks, current and future", which reassures me as Bishop of this diocese. I know how much time is put in by these two groups, mainly volunteers as they scrutinise and offer reflection on all the work of the safeguarding team. I would particularly like to thank the two chairs of these committees, Mr Hugh Williams and Canon Brendan Killeen. Their diligent work means that all casework and practices are governed in a "robust and effective" manner.

Our diocesan safeguarding team are second to none. The report highlights that the "Diocese has maximised it's modest clergy and lay resources to deliver effective safeguarding practice". Danielle Dixon, our diocesan safeguarding coordinator and Laura Lester, the safeguarding support officer, have developed a professional environment which firmly roots safeguarding within the mission of our Church.

I wish to take a moment to reassure you all that we will continue to evaluate and reflect upon the resources available for safeguarding in our diocese. As a Church, we rely heavily on the generosity of volunteers and as well as my thanks to all those currently engaged in this vital effort, I would like to encourage anyone wishing to volunteer to have an informal conversation with a member of our team.

I am encouraged by the positive way in which we place the most vulnerable at the heart of our mission and I am grateful to Deacon Peter Collins and his team who make up the Healing and Reconciliation Group. This group seek ways to proactively reach out to victims and survivors of abuse in small ways which can increase our understanding of the impact of abuse and develop resources which can help an individual in their journey towards healing. The report refers to this work as "inspirational and innovative" which we should all be proud of.

As we continually seek to improve our safeguarding services, again, I would like to encourage each of you. Safeguarding in the diocese of Northampton is not a departmental responsibility but a culture which relies on every member of our parish and diocesan communities playing their part. This report highlights the good practice across all eight national standards and the positivity of the report is a reflection of the culture created by each of you.
